Laurinburg/Scotland County chosen by the Board of Trustees as the home to the new Presbyterian College.

1957

The Board-appointed panel issued a document called the "Chapel Hill Report" in the summer of 1957 that led to the formation of the widely acclaimed Christianity and Culture program. (C&C)



Flora Macdonald College merged with Presbyterian Junior College in Maxton, NC, to establish St. Andrews.



Ansley C. Moore appointed 1st President by the Presbytery before the college opened.



September 23, 1960

The Board of Directors name the new institution St. Andrews Presbyterian College.



1966

The Physical Education building and O'Herron Pool are completed.



1970s Student Center renovated and renamed



Henry Belk Student Center, Katherine McKay Belk Tower also constructed. Morgan Jones and Avinger Auditorium completed.



November 23, 1974

The first Science Olympiad held on the St. Andrews campus. The founding of this event eventually led to a state-wide competition currently held each year.

The core programs of the college were revised to incoprated C&C, SAS and STMS programs. The new St. Andrews General Edcuation program (SAGE) broke new ground in curriculum development by introducing interdisciplinary studies.

St. Andrews extended its high-quality education to adult learners through a satellite campus at nearby Sandhills Community College in Pinehurst.

The college first appeared in US News & World Report. Each year since that first appearance, this well-known publication has ranked St. Andrews in the 4th Tier among the nation's best liberal arts schools.

April 15, 1959

A groundbreaking ceremony, held at what is now the east end of Lake Ansley Moore marked the beginning of the construction of the physical plant on the 800-acre plant site.

1996

The Therapeutic Riding degree began and was the first undergraduate degree of its kind in the country. The St. Andrews Equestrian Team continues to be national champions.

2011

Webber International University and St. Andrews Presbyterian College received approval to merge the two institutions. SAPC became a branch campus of WIU and changed its name to St. Andrews University.
